

Fretwork, breezeblocks, casement windows, VJ walls and hardwood floors; there's a lot to love about Queensland architecture.

Join us as we dive into State Library of Queensland's collections and bring to life the rich histories of the houses around us through digital fabrication techniques such as laser cutting and engraving and create a miniature piece of QLD architecture with our book nook design.

- getting inspired by Queensland architecture through the enormous wealth of the collections here at State Library of Queensland.
- learning to create vector files suitable for the laser cutter in free and open-source software (Inkscape).



- An A5 sheet 0.7mm PETG film or 1.5mm acrylic (windows and door panes)
- Tacky craft glue / UHU or Gorilla glue
- Gouache paint
- Watercolour paint
- Acrylic paint colours
- Acrylic medium (gloss and matte)
- Sharpies or other coloured pens (for stained-glass painting

What defines a Queenslander?

Wikipedia - 'The quintessential Queenslander is a single detached house made of timber with a corrugated iron roof located on a separate block of land.[1] They are all high-set, single-storey dwellings with a characteristic veranda that extends around the house to varying extents but never entirely surrounds it. In later years, many have been renovated to enclose part or all of these verandas to create extra bedrooms. The under-house area is often also enclosed to provide extra living area to these houses, which leads to the common misconception that an authentic Queenslander has two storeys.' https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Queenslander (architecture)




MINIATURE SCALE

Miniature scale varies, there are several standard sizes and you can buy or create items to suit the different sizing.

Standardized sizes for modern dollhouses include 1:6, 1:12, 1:16, 1:24, and 1:48, while antique houses are often a custom size.

Book nooks exist on any kind of scale, but most are on a scale of 1:24 or close to.

Our Queenslander book nooks are close to 1:24, more like 1:23 scale, which
means we can find designs or buy items at that scale for our nook.







Inkscape 101


INKSCAPE TIPS



- Most important check the size of your document and make sure you are working in A2 landscape and millimeters
- Remember to group and ungroup as needed
- Keeping your 'parts' assigned to different layers can help
- Naming your layers will help keep you organised

CREATING VECTORS

We're going to screenshot an image of the designs from the 99 Everyday homes catalogue, like these casement windows, to trace with our pen and shape tools to practice creating vector designs.



NOOK DESIGN TEMPLATES


